'Remove dump from Kingdom's gateway'

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■ Spectacular views of South and East Kerry

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Now, locals in the Ahanboy Community Group are demanding that Kerry County Council do more to develop 'the gateway to Kerry' which they say is currently a 'dumpstered wasteland'.

However, in a reply to Kerry's Eye this week, the Council stated the deposit site is 'strategically' located, would require funding to move and that any improvement works 'must be considered in the context of the road safety advice from Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII)'.

Speaking on behalf of the group, Seamus Fleming said that two thirds of the view is currently obscured by the Council's Materials Reservoir Dump and that the improvement works required at Glounsharoon would be 'bread and butter' for the Council.

Mr Fleming told Kerry's Eye: "I understand that we are in tough times, but there's still a huge opportunity to develop this site. "I'm not talking about building the Taj Mahal at Glounsharoon or anything, but as you're coming from Abbeyfeale, the first thing you see here is the Council dump.

"The dump actually obscures the majestic views as you approach Kerry from the Limerick side - it's madness," he said, "the first thing you see is the dump."

The local group are calling for the Council to:

- relocate the dump to a more discrete site
- resurface the area and incorporate it within the existing layby area
- create a new climbing lane across the road from the viewing point to create room for a traffic island and right-turning lane to the viewing area
- create a clean, open space surrounded by a small limestone wall that utilises the East Kerry vista for motorists as they enter Kerry. Just under a year ago, Kerry's Eye highlighted local demands for

a reduced speed limit along this stretch of the N21 which many regard as 'treacherous'.

Mr Fleming says some safety works have since been carried out on minor roads, but claimed 'it was like pulling teeth to get the job done'.

Commenting on the viewing point, he stated: "For some reason the Council and LAP (Local Area Plan) refuses to see the potential of this fantastic and incredible resource and it now has become a wasteland.

"With all the talk of developing tourism, this is the nonsense that is going on in Kerry.

"Glounsharoon should be developed to exploit its incredible tourism potential for the benefit of Kerry and all of Ireland.

"It is a no brainer," he added, "for

over 40 years now, this spot has not been harnessed for its true potential."

Mr Fleming also applauded efforts by Councillor Jackie Healy-Rae to get the project moving, while chairperson of the Castleisland Chamber Alliance Michael John Kearney said councillors and members of the municipal district have been working together with the community group to see the site 'brought up' to standard, so that it will hopefully 'be ready in time for next year's season'.

The Council have also stated that TII, which has responsibility for the design, construction and maintenance of the national road network, have expressed a desire to reduce the number of access points on to the national road at this location to 'improve safety'.
